BATTERSEA ACADEMY IS EXTENDING THE CHARITY'S REACH TO HELP ANIMALS EVERYWHERE

At the end of 2018, Battersea launched the Battersea Academy, its new international centre for professional development to support rescue and rehoming organisations across the globe. The Academy brings the charity's 159 years of experience to the fore and will equip animal welfare practitioners with the knowledge and skills they need to increase their organisation's effectiveness and impact.

Based at our iconic London centre, the aim of the Academy is to enable

every rescue, whatever their size or resources, to do the best with what they have. The Academy provides a range of programmes of between one and five days, and the content is tailored to the needs of the organisations attending.

Twenty-seven organisations, from as near as London and as far afield as Australia, attended Academy programmes in 2018, and in 2019 we expect around 50 organisations to attend. Over the next five years the Academy will transform the lives of up to 150,000 dogs and cats.

Executive Head of the Battersea Academy Paul Marvell says, "For 159 years, our charity has rescued and rehomed dogs and cats across the UK. We're now using our unparalleled experience, along with the knowledge we've gained on the front line, to help improve the lives of many more animals across the UK and around the world."

# BRANDS HATCH HAS OPENED NEW OUTDOOR CAT ENCLOSURES TO IMPROVE THEIR QUALITY OF LIFE

Our Brands Hatch centre officially unveiled its new dedicated outdoor space for cats at the end of 2018. Named Collingwood Mews, the centre's three new enclosures will allow cats who especially enjoy time outdoors to stretch their paws in an engaging and protected outside space. The enclosures feature a solar panelled water fountain, trees and plants, a bench for human visitors, steps for climbing, and a shed complete with heater, cat flap, food and blankets. The new enclosures were the result of generous donations, and the official opening included the dedication of a plaque marking the occasion. We're sure our Kent cats will really love spending time in this wonderful new space.



# [SUPPORTERS] LOTTERY RAISES £2.9M FOR BATTERSEA

Battersea received an incredible £800,000 from People's Postcode Lottery last year. This generous support has had a direct impact on the lives of thousands of animals that came through the gates of our three rescue centres during 2018.

The money has helped us to continue our much-needed work across different areas, including providing excellent veterinary treatment to the animals in our care and engaging with local communities to offer support and advice to pet owners and councils. During 2018, Battersea's veterinary team

helped dogs and cats with an array of

medical issues, ranging from minor dental work and neutering through to major surgeries and longterm treatments costing tens of thousands of pounds.

The funds raised by the lottery's players helped many animals receive vital care. The players of People's

Postcode Lottery have been supporting Battersea since 2014 and have so far raised a total of £2.9m for unwanted or abandoned dogs and cats.

# **POGDOGS PICKS UP THIRD NTA**

# [ANIMAL WELFARE] MINISTER VISITS BATTERSEA

# THE ANIMAL WELFARE MINISTER HAS MARKED A STEP FORWARD IN THE PROTECTION AND WELFARE OF PUPPIES AND KITTENS

The Animal Welfare Minister David Rutley has visited Battersea to confirm the Government's commitment to banning third-party sales of puppies and kittens under six months old.


The Minister's visit came as the Government revealed that 95% of respondents to its Consultation into third-party sales were overwhelmingly supportive of a ban. A huge victory for animal welfare, the ban will make it illegal for puppy farmers to use third-party sellers, such as pet shops or fake 'homes', to mask their business of selling puppies to unsuspecting owners.

Battersea's Chief Executive, Claire Horton, welcomed confirmation of the ban. "Properly enforced, this will help put an end to dogs being used as breeding machines and kept in shocking conditions," she said. "It makes all breeders accountable, makes it harder to make a profit by duping the public, and reassures future owners that they can adopt from a safe and trusted source and ideally from a rescue centre."

# DAISY BLOOMS IN HER NEW HOME

Daisy, a nine-year-old Mastiff cross, first came into Battersea eight years ago as a young and energetic dog, staying with us for just 15 days. After a change in circumstances, Daisy returned to Battersea late last year as a much older dog and caught the attention of international press when – even after 100 days in our London centre – no one had offered her a new family, earning her the title of 'The UK's unluckiest rescue dog'. Thankfully, Daisy was spotted by Louise Daily and her two children, who saw her story online and thought she was the perfect dog for them. After 124 days at Battersea, Daisy joined her new family in the Hertfordshire countryside just in time for a very happy Christmas.





# 5 MINUTES WITH... CRAIG PERERA, TEAM LEADER AT BATTERSEA OLD WINDSOR

# What's the most rewarding part of your job?

I coordinate the dog rehoming team, which works to find the best homes possible for the dogs in our care. The biggest reward is seeing the joy on customers' faces when they rehome a dog from us and the hope that the dog will enjoy the rest of its life in a loving home.

#### What's the Battersea accomplishment you're most proud of?

Being named as Battersea Old Windsor Staff Member of the Year in 2016. To earn that sort of respect from your peers was very special, especially as the quality of staff here is so high.

#### Tell us about an animal in your care that stood out.

My current foster dog Tyson, a 10-year-old Staffordshire Bull Terrier (pictured) who is still looking for a home. He has been with me for over nine months and is just the most amazingly intelligent and comical chap. Even on the tougher days, he never fails to raise my spirits.

A supporter of Battersea for many years, when animal-lover Ed Cave sadly passed away last year, his wife Jacqui knew there was only one fitting way to honour his memory.

"We were keen to support Battersea in Ed's memory," Jacqui says. "Ed had always loved dogs. As a toddler, he was often found cuddled up in his beloved black Labrador Rosie's bed."

A JustGiving page was set up, requesting donations to Battersea instead of flowers, and has raised over  $\pm 10,000$  to date – an incredible amount to help our dogs and cats, for which we are truly grateful. "I know that Ed would have been overwhelmed and delighted by how much was raised," Jacqui says.



# DOGS CAN LEARN NEW TRICKS AT BOW

NEW BUILDINGS WILL IMPROVE TRAINING FACILITIES

Those who visit our Battersea Old Windsor (BOW) site regularly will likely have noticed a host of building works going on recently. And now, thanks to the generous support of all our donors, the new training facility is up and running after a few short months of construction on the project. The new facility will help provide a warm and dry indoor training space for our dogs.

The project is part of ongoing property developments to improve the level of care we can give our animals across all three centres. The building opened for use in the new year. Meanwhile, more building work to construct new kennels is currently underway.

# [HAPPY ENDINGS] PUPPY FARM DOGS GET THEIR HAPPY ENDINGS

You may have seen in the Christmas Day special episode of *Paul O'Grady: For the Love of Dogs*, that towards the end of 2018 Battersea took in a large number of dogs that had been rescued from a puppy farm. Some were in a bad way and taken straight to our clinic. Others had never even walked on a lead and had to be carried into kennels. Battersea's staff worked tirelessly, and after three weeks the first of the dogs were ready to start their new lives, while others required more medical care and training before facing the world. After 121 days, the last of the group, Willow the Beagle and Morris the Cocker Spaniel, found new homes. 

# NO PLACE LIKE HOME

# "THOUSANDS OF ANIMALS ARE LOSING LOVING HOMES AND STAYING LONGER IN RESCUE CENTRES"

According to Government statistics, eight million households in the UK rent their homes, equalling 38% of all households, and this figure is predicted to rise to 40% by 2025.

In London the figure is even higher, expected to reach 60% by 2025. Unfortunately, 'Generation Rent' does not bring with it good news for pets and their owners. With many landlords choosing to ban pets, tenants are being deprived of the health and social benefits that can come with pet ownership and thousands of animals each year are losing their loving homes and staying longer in rescue centres as the pool of potential adopters shrinks.

Residents in social housing are particularly vulnerable to the barriers surrounding pet ownership. Although 'no pets' policies are common in private rentals, Battersea's research has revealed that 21% of London Councils and 64% of the capital's largest Housing Associations ban owning dogs in social housing flats with no direct garden or street access.

While 3.4 million UK homes are socially rented, the sector is dominated by a few big landlords, and tenants stay in their homes three times longer than those in the private sector. The policies of Local Authorities and Housing Associations therefore have a profound effect on many people.

#### What is Battersea doing about this?

In November last year, Battersea launched a new campaign called Pet Friendly Properties. Through this campaign, we aim to help reduce the number of social housing tenants who are forced to give up a beloved pet – or denied the chance of getting a dog or cat in the first place – because of their housing situation.

We're offering two solutions to encourage pet ownership in London social housing. Firstly, we're giving London Councils and Housing Associations advice on how they can review and improve their own policies around pets. Secondly, we are offering to provide training and support for tenants who want to own a pet in social housing.

Our 'model pet policy' provides Local Authorities and Housing Associations with a template that can be adapted and used to support existing tenancy agreements, setting out the conditions and standards which social housing providers can expect of pet-owning residents, as well as providing a document that pet owners can refer to for advice and support.

And, Battersea's new Pet Friendly Training Programme offers social housing tenants the

opportunity to gain vital pet ownership skills to help them provide the best home environment for their pets.

In our view, by working together with London Councils and Housing Associations, we can bring people and pets together for happier homes and communities. Battersea's Chief Executive, Claire Horton, says: "The current postcode lottery facing tenants in social housing is unfair and we want to see more consistent, pet-friendly policies across London's Councils and Housing Associations.

"The health, social and community benefits of owning a pet are well proven, yet last year we saw hundreds of dogs and cats arrive at Battersea when their distraught owners couldn't find petfriendly accommodation. Sadly, this is seen by rescue centres across the country.

"If tenants were given more flexibility around pet ownership, it would end the worry and heartache of not knowing if they'll be able to keep their pet when they move – not to mention saving countless pets having to end up homeless in animal shelters."

# **BUBBLES AND MAIZIE**

One tenant who has benefited is Joyce 'Bubbles' Neal (pictured above), who lives in a flat and is a full-time carer for her mum, who has dementia. Two years ago, Bubbles adopted 11-year-old Shih Tzu Maizie. "I always thought I wouldn't have a dog," she says. "But it's the best thing I've ever done. Maizie means the world to me, and she will sit with my mum and make her smile. Having Maizie has made things so much better for both of us."

# BATTERSEA PAYS TRIBUTE TO AN ANIMAL LOVER WHO SUPPORTED THE CHARITY FOR ALMOST NINE DECADES

Maureen Brass first came to Battersea with her mother in 1929, when she was only 14 years old and looking for a new family pet. It was love at first sight for Miss Brass and a rather sorry-looking stray named Jyp who had arrived in a bad way. The pair became firm friends and Maureen trained clever Jyp to do agility in the garden and take messages to her mother asking for a glass of milk and a biscuit while she did her homework upstairs.

Almost a decade after Jyp joined the Brass family, World War II broke out and Miss Brass, now a school teacher, had to leave her beloved Battersea dog with her parents while she accompanied her pupils to Kettering during a mass evacuation of London children. Sadly, in 1942, Jyp passed away. It wasn't until the summer of 1954 that Miss Brass was ready to adopt her next Battersea pet.

Upon returning to Battersea's London centre, Miss Brass remarked upon how much the place had changed since her first visit. Gone were the dog yards beneath the old railway arches, and in their place were wonderful new kennels. It was in one of these kennels that Miss Brass spotted lively Rusty. The copper-coloured Mongrel jumped up and down every time Miss Brass walked past his kennel and she knew this was a sign that he was meant for her. The 18-month-old dog was quick to make an impression with everyone in the community, from the pupils at the school where Miss Brass taught, to the local policemen. During a

perfectly friendly exchange between Miss Brass and a local police officer, the protective Rusty was quick to defend his owner's honour and had a lot to say for himself; fortunately he didn't get himself arrested.

Rusty soon became a regular fixture at St Dominic's School in north-west London where Miss Brass taught from 1938 until her retirement in 1980. Former pupils still remember Rusty as a 'character' and recall being sent to spend time with the dog when they had been naughty and needed to calm down. Rusty spent 13 years by Miss Brass' side and she described those years with him as 'wonderful'.

LASTING LEGACIES

During her time as a teacher, Miss Brass made it her mission to get children from underprivileged backgrounds involved with music to help enrich their lives. She taught groups of students to sing and to play the recorder, with some of her pupils even performing at the Royal Albert Hall. Miss Brass also used music as an opportunity to fundraise for Battersea, including a marvellous choir performance in Trafalgar Square. Even after she retired. Miss Brass continued to organise reunions with some of her former pupils and everyone would get together to play their old recorders.

Miss Brass was not just a lover of dogs, she was also a lifelong cat lover and her final pet to be adopted from Battersea was a cat named Tibby in November 2005. During her visit to Battersea's cattery, Miss Brass met a member of the rehoming team who took her to meet a forlorn-looking cat hiding in her pen. Feeling sorry for the timid cat, Miss Brass took her home that day. Tibby soon came out of her shell to become an affectionate lifelong companion.

As Miss Brass got older, she wanted to make sure Tibby would be cared for should anything happen to her, so she signed up for Battersea's Forever Loved service, entrusting Tibby to Battersea should the need arise. In the end, the service wasn't required as Tibby sadly passed away just a week before her owner did.

In October 2018, Miss Brass passed away at the remarkable age of 103. At her request, Battersea's Legacy team made all the funeral arrangements and, as her executor, are managing her estate. More than 100 people attended the funeral, including Battersea staff and former pupils who had lots of lovely things to say about Miss Brass and her dogs. During the service some former pupils played their recorders to honour Miss Brass' enduring dedication. A four-legged Battersea representative was also there to meet well-wishers.

The devoted Miss Brass showed her support for Battersea a final time by leaving part of her estate to the charity. The proceeds will go towards helping the thousands of dogs and cats that come through our gates every year, ensuring that many more animals, just like Jyp, Rusty and Tibby, will find their own loving homes. We are so incredibly grateful for her support.

# FROM THE PRISON SERVICE TO MEDICAL DETECTION, FOR SOME BATTERSEA DOGS A TRADITIONAL FAMILY HOME IS NOT ALWAYS THE ANSWER...

Battersea is perhaps most widely known as a place where people can come to give a dog a second chance at living a happy life in a family home. But what is less known about the 159-yearold charity is that Battersea has a team of dedicated staff that also help to train and rehome dogs to several different working outlets, from the prison service to medical detection dogs and many other disciplines in-between.

In fact, Battersea has been training and rehoming dogs ever since World War I, when dogs would be recruited and deployed to the front line in France to help find and rescue soldiers injured in battle, as well as helping with other vital wartime tasks such as keeping guard of the camps.

Nowadays, Battersea still supplies dogs who carry out important work in our society, whether that's sniffing out explosives, or providing emotional support to those who need it. Jeff Moore, Working Dogs Manager at Battersea, says, "Not all dogs and cats that arrive at Battersea are well-suited to life in a domestic home, so Battersea will seek to find them an alternative home. Many dogs were bred originally as working dogs and certain breeds such as Border Collies, Labradors and Terriers thrive in a working role that provides plenty of mental and physical stimulation.

"There are so many kinds of working dogs and, while all of their roles vary, I often look for the same traits in each dog to know if they'd be suitable for a working environment.

"I always look for dogs that are confident enough to cope with different environments, and who are sociable and willing to interact with humans. These are two of the most important traits for a working dog to have if they're going to be successful in their new roles."

Jeff explains, "Here at Battersea, I see a lot





of potential working dogs come through our gates who are also under-socialised and not used to new and different environments. So, at times, it can be hard to tell if they'd be best suited to a working home or not.

"If this is the case, then I always check to see if they have a willingness to interact and play with toys. If they do, I can start working with their motivations and teach them to play some basic search games to begin their training."

While temperament is a vital part of what it takes to be a working dog, there are other qualities that a Battersea dog should ideally display if they're going to be rehomed to a working outlet.

"The ideal age for a Battersea dog to go to a working home would be anywhere from 12 months to three-and-a-half years old" explains Jeff, "Any working dog would also need to be medically fit to work, just the same as any human thinking of going to work in the services."

#### What's breed got to do with it?

There are some breeds that are typically associated with being working dogs. Labradors and Spaniels are typically used for scent work – such as narcotic or explosives detection – and breeds such as German Shepherds, Malinois and Rottweilers are often used for patrol work.

"Over the years, different breeds have become associated with different kinds of work because of their natural breed traits," says Jeff. "Dogs like German Shepherds and Rottweilers are a guarding breed and are likely to be naturally more protective of the area they're patrolling, whereas Labradors and Spaniels are gundogs and will naturally want to sniff things out when they're in a room, while ignoring everyone else!"

While certain breeds may excel at certain types of jobs, at Battersea we believe that a dog's breed shouldn't hold them back if they have all the other qualities that a working home would require.

And, recently, this was proved when Battersea rehomed Staffordshire Bull Terrier Cookie to the

HMP Six Counties Search Team, where she is now in training to detect drugs. Cookie was the first of her breed to hold such an important role in the prison service, and viewers of our ITV series *Paul O'Grady: For the Love of Dogs* may recall seeing her story on the show last year.

Jeff recalls, "From her first session, Cookie showed great potential, so we were really hopeful that she'd be able to find a working home wellsuited to her needs. She's very sociable and clever, and is a very high-energy dog, so I knew that in the right setting she could channel all that into doing something great.

"Cookie is a prime example of how dogs of any breed shouldn't be judged on their looks or 'reputation' alone. Any dog who is smart and loves the mental and physical stimulation of working with trainers has the potential to be an incredible working dog," Jeff adds.

# AJ'S STORY

Typical of his breed, AJ the Labrador proved to be a bouncy character during his time at Battersea, full of energy and excitement. Originally handed in to Battersea when his owners had a baby and could no longer give AJ the attention he needed, our team of specialist canine behaviourists noticed a strong leaning within AJ towards a working dog lifestyle.

After Jeff and his team began working with AJ on sniffer training, it was clear that he had found his calling. Luckily, a potential home with the British Transport Police had become available, and the lucky Labrador was soon off to his new role as an explosives detection dog in train stations across the UK.

PC Mark Read, AJ's handler, tells Battersea, "AJ is known as 'PD', which is Police Dog. His job is to search for explosives on the mainline and underground railway networks. He has got a very sensitive nose and he is very, very good."

PC Steve Witcomb adds, "The initial assessment by the team at Battersea was excellent. He turned up in very good condition, very well looked after by Battersea and obviously his previous owners. It was just that he was so exuberant, he needed to work. He needs to be out doing something every day, so he is the ideal dog for us."

Steve continues, "AJ is very driven to search – he loves his work. Throughout the force he's got a very good reputation. As soon as he walks into the station, he knows exactly what he's doing." See more of AJ's story at youtube.com/battersea

# THROUGH THE AGES

**HOW DO I CARE FOR MY PET AS IT GETS OLDER?** YOUR DOG OR CAT'S NEEDS CAN CHANGE OVER THEIR LIFETIME – MAKE SURE YOU'RE GIVING THEM EVERYTHING THEY NEED TO GROW, WITH BATTERSEA'S TOP TIPS

# CATS

**NUTRITION** When bringing a kitten home, it's best to stick with the food it's used to for the first week, to reduce the chance of an upset stomach. If you change food, do so gradually by mixing a little of the new food with their current food.

**BEHAVIOUR** Kittens love to play. You can easily make toys out of things like toilet rolls! Don't encourage them to play with hands or feet, or they might think of them as toys for life. Get them used to being brushed, especially long-haired cats. **MEDICAL** Your kitten will need to be regularly treated for fleas and worms with a treatment specific to its age and/or weight. Check you have a vaccination record from the breeder or rescue centre and take note of when they will need their booster injections.



DOGS

**NUTRITION** Be consistent with their feeding schedule so they get used to eating at certain times of day. Try not to give in to cries or begging for food outside of these times, as this will teach your puppy that they can demand food whenever they want. Instead, use mealtimes as an opportunity to practise training. BEHAVIOUR Whether it's mouthing, jumping up or chewing furniture, puppies can display a lot of 'naughty' behaviours. Telling them off might reinforce bad habits, so reward good behaviour and don't engage when they're behaving in an undesirable way. MEDICAL Before bringing your puppy home, make sure you understand their medical needs – have they been vaccinated and treated for fleas and worms? Consider insuring your puppy, particularly if its breed has a greater risk of certain health conditions.

NUTRITION A cat that spends a lot of time outside and is very active will need more food than a sedentary or indoor-only cat. But this can vary – even the most active cat may prefer to stay inside during winter, so its diet should be adjusted accordingly. BEHAVIOUR Most cats like to explore and climb. There are plenty of 'cat trees' that incorporate scratching posts and places to sleep, or help them access the top of a cupboard by placing other furniture nearby. A high space helps them feel safe. MEDICAL Dental disease is very common in cats, with many needing teeth extracted at some point in their lives. You could also consider brushing your cat's teeth daily if they'll tolerate it. Ask your vet for advice on cat-friendly toothpaste and brushes. NUTRITION As cats age, their sense of smell and taste diminishes, which can result in a loss of appetite. If your cat needs some encouragement to eat, try feeding smaller meals more often and serve it near room temperature to make it more palatable. **BEHAVIOUR** Cats may go outside less as they get older, due to being less confident about defending their territory. Consider securing your garden to keep other cats out, so yours can explore in peace. A litter tray gives them the option of staying inside. **MEDICAL** Older cats can be more prone to health problems, particularly kidney and thyroid diseases, so if you spot any changes in appetite or thirst, consult your vet. Cats can hide their symptoms, so regular health checks could detect problems early.

# ADULT

NUTRITION The variety of dog food available can be overwhelming, so stick to one brand that your dog enjoys. Use treats only as a reward and avoid those with high sugar content and colouring. Treats should not make up more than 15% of your dog's diet. **BEHAVIOUR** Most dog owners know the importance of physical exercise, but mental stimulation also has great benefits. This can be as simple as practising commands in fun games. Try a puzzle feeder, or hiding small treats to see if they can find them all. MEDICAL It can be tempting to let your dog swim in a local pond or lake, but take care with water covered in algae, as some blue-green algae that 'bloom' during hot and dry periods can be highly toxic. If you're worried your dog might have ingested anything harmful, seek veterinary advice immediately.

NUTRITION As your dog's activity levels decrease, their calorie intake needs adjusting to prevent weight gain. Rather than reducing portions, which could leave them feeling short-changed, try a lower calorie food - many foods for older dogs are created for this. **BEHAVIOUR** Just because their body is getting older, your dog's mind won't necessarily be slowing down. Try teaching them a few new tricks or see if they enjoy a new toy. Exercise them little and often staying active is important to maintain their health. **MEDICAL** Be vigilant to any changes in behaviour. Sight and hearing may worsen, and they might not move as easily. Older dogs are also more prone to lumps and bumps, incontinence, appetite changes and more. If you notice changes in your dog, especially if they happen quickly, consult your vet.




